

CHILD WELFARE

BLACK CHILDREN AND HISPANIC CHILDREN have disproportionately higher rates of CPS referrals

BLACK CHILDREN have disproportionately higher substantiation rates

BLACK CHILDREN AND CHILDREN OF **MULTIPLE RACES** have disproportionately higher rates of valid **GPS** allegations
